    - i. You need to learn to correct yourself—this is a more practical, academic skill
    - ii. Working with others is essential to your content courses at a university
    - iii. You usually say everything I would say anyway, but when it comes from you, I know you understand the concepts that we've talked about in class.
  - b. Benefits
    - i. Helping someone else also helps you
    - ii. Reading something better than your work also helps you
- 2. The process of peer review.
  - a. Overview of the process.
    - i. Present papers
    - ii. Read papers
    - iii. Write feedback
    - iv. Discuss in groups
  - b. Completing the peer review form.
    - i. Overview the form.
    - ii. See examples of good and back feedback.
    - iii. In this draft we are editing for IDEAS, not grammar!!

- 3. How to fill out the author's cover letter.
  - a. You are the author!
  - b. Be specific.
  - c. This helps me and your readers know what to look for when reading.
- 4. Present papers to your group.
  - a. Present what you wrote in your author's cover letter to your group.
